### Health Care: What Went Wrong?


Obviously, no one thing brought the popularity of the health care effort to the point where, in a January 22<sup>nd</sup> poll, only 39% said Congress should continue to work on the issue. There is, however, one aspect of the problem that has received little comment. When it came down to the wire, the plan was basically a program to benefit low wage working people, and those are rarely popular in the US.

The White House, Congress and the great majority of policy organizations backing the legislation, started out by conceding the core argument of the insurance industry and the right wing. They agreed that private for-profit health insurance is better than public not-for-profit insurance. Yes, they included a public option in the bill that was otherwise based on private insurance, but the Department of Health and Human Services estimated that, with its higher cost, only 9% of the population would choose the public option.

Because the proposal was based on getting people into private profit-making insurance plans, it had to violate one of the key principles for the success of any social legislation. The plan was not <u>universal</u>. It would have been far too expensive to make it so. Programs such as Social Security and Medicare are popular because they are universal and benefit everyone. Programs such as farm subsidies, Medicaid and welfare are less popular with the middle class. Sad to say, they get still less popular as the population served becomes poorer.

The legislation in both houses barred anyone who already had insurance from participating in the insurance exchanges that were to be created, as well as in the public option. Basically, the plan, with its subsidies, would have benefited mainly the 14% of the population that has no insurance, (with a small additional number of special exceptions). At the same time, whether through premiums, taxes or cuts in Medicare, the entire population would have paid for it. This has never been a formula for political success. The program, unfortunately, was resting on top of one of the major fault lines in our society.

#### Hydraulic Gas Drilling – A Risk to New York State's Water Supply

A new method of drilling for natural gas is about to be used in New York State. Hydraulic fracturing, or "hydrofracking," uses millions of gallons of water that becomes contaminated such that leaks can cause damage to the water supply. Its use in other states has led to contaminated wells, excessive air pollution, and exploded homes. Damage to the New York City watershed would cause the need for a filtration plant that would cost several billion dollars. Three Parks and other environmental groups recognize that any risk to New York City's water poses a risk to the entire State.

The NYS Department of Environmental Conservation issued an 800-page draft Generic Environmental Impact Statement ("dGEIS") with a comment period of only thirty days. The paper left out many of the dangers of fracking. It made no realistic provisions for the disposal contaminated water and omitted the potential for Environmental groups, New York accidents. City's Department of Environmental Protection, and Borough President Stringer's office are demanding that the dGEIS be withdrawn and a new study issued that accurately reflects the dangers of hydraulic fracturing.

At the Three Parks January meeting, the membership approved a resolution calling for a statewide ban on hydraulic fracturing. The Club is to protect our air and water; we will continue to have weekend tables on Broadway, weather permitting. We have already sent 250 letters to Governor Paterson.

A January 25 "lobby day" in Albany brought several hundred people to visit legislators, including LI Democrat Steve Englebright and upstate Republican Senator George Maziarz. Englebright, trained as a geologist, clearly understood the dangers of fracking and agreed there is no safe way to filter the millions of gallons of water that will be produced. Assembly Member Englebright reminded us that we should treat this as an election year issue. He said that resolutions from groups were really valuable and that activists should announce they will oppose candidates who favor hydraulic fracturing.

Senator Maziarz, the new chair of the Senate Committee on Energy and Telecommunications, represents a district near Lake Erie where toxic dumping is a serious problem. He has no opinion on this issue as of yet. Upstaters will continue to lobby him to support a ban on gas drilling.

## Census Count More Important Than Ever to New York

#### Census Day is April 1st!

In a typical year, \$335 billion in Federal dollars for the top ten Federal programs are Federal assistance to localities -- and last year, under the "stimulus," over \$478 billion, or 84% of Federal aid, was sent out.

Census data is just so important -- <u>it's how</u> <u>federal aid is targeted for highways and transit, education, health care, and housing.</u>

If you ignore the census form, it will have an effect on your neighborhood and all of New York for the next ten years. So if you multiply the typical \$335 billion by ten, and well over three <u>trillion</u> dollars will be allocated in the next decade using population reports from this year's census!


