This promises to be an that instructive evening will include information currently underreported by the media. Albany Update Assembly Member Daniel O'Donnell

With the budget behind us, Albany turns to legislation. I wanted to share the details of a bill that I recently introduced that would begin to institutionalize the cooperation of state environmental and transportation agencies to more effectively tackle the problems of pollution caused by motor vehicles, traffic volume that affects both pollution levels and wear on roadways, and the need for revenue for the maintenance and upkeep of roads and bridges. The bill, A.10638, would establish the Sustainable Transportation Policy Task Force, a body that would be charged with examining ways in which environmental sustainability policies can be applied to or combined with transportation policy.

If passed, the legislation will provide a mechanism for long-term planning by adding sustainability to various state statutes and board and agency missions, as well as create a task force to develop tangible solutions that encourage environmentally responsible decision-making about vehicle purchases and driving habits. The task force would take a closer look at models that require vehicle owners to contribute their fair share, based on the type of vehicle they own, towards the maintenance of roads, bridges and tunnels. The immediate, and most specific, goal is to have the task force develop recommendations for toll and fee changes that will take into account vehicles' weight, emissions ratings and fuel efficiency.

It is anticipated that new fee and toll structures would reward smaller, lighter and more efficient vehicles and penalize larger, heavier, more heavily polluting and less fuel efficient vehicles. Variable fee and toll structures already exist, to a limited extent: trucks pay higher tolls than cars, and vehicle registration fees include a calculation based on weight. However, with the exception of the Port Authority's "Green Pass," tolls do not differentiate among cars, treating hybrids, small cars with low emissions, large SUV's

and other light trucks equally. The task force would evaluate the relevant factors and develop vehicle categories for such variable tolls.

I am circulating the bill for comment among environmental advocacy and transportation sustainability groups. A.10638 will hopefully place the conversation about addressing problems of traffic volume, funding for this state's vital transportation infrastructure, and improving air quality in a statewide context.

Dump that old computer: Local groups to sponsor electronics collection on May 17-19

It's time to clear out your closets!

With computers outdated almost as soon as they're delivered and a switch to digital TV transmissions just eight months away, it's likely that you have some piece of old electronic equipment jammed into a closet or sitting in your hallway.

You could leave them at the curb for garbage pick-up. But you shouldn't – since these items contain materials that are toxic when land-filled improperly or incinerated.

Most electronic equipment collected curbside in Manhattan is burned just across the river by the city at the Newark incinerator. Proper recycling is a far better alternative, since computers and TVs typically contain lead, mercury and other materials that are dangerous when burned and released into the air.

Instead, wait just a few days until May 17-19, when the Lower East Side Ecology Center sets up an electronics collection bin on Broadway at an event sponsored by the 104th Street Block Association, the 102-103th Street Block Association, State Senator Eric Schneiderman and Assembly Member Daniel O'Donnell (sponsor list in formation).

The collection dates are:

Saturday, May 17 and Sunday, May 18 from 10 AM- 4 PM. Monday, May 19, 4-7 PM

The LESEC will set up a bin on the west side of Broadway between 102nd and 103rd streets in front of Radio Shack and Strawberry stores. There is no cost for collection and items donated are tax-deductible. Items collected include:

- Computer equipment
- TVs
- Cell phones, phones & equipment
- MP3 players (iPods, etc.)
- Playstations.

While the City Council recently passed bills that require manufacturers to collect their own products, collection programs won't begin until July 2009. So take this chance to get rid of these unwanted items quickly and safely.

LATEST JUDICIAL NEWS By Alan Flacks

In the last weeks, there have been some strange events on the judicial front here in Manhattan (the First Judicial District). State Supreme Court Justice James Yates, who was to retire on April 28th, 2008, to become Gov. Paterson's counsel, changed his mind, saying he prefers being a judge. observers thought that he would be appointed Chief Judge next year when Judith Kaye Perhaps it would appear less retires. unseemly to have him appointed as the State's Chief Judge from the ranks of judges than appear to be seen as an appointment as a crony of the Governor. Perhaps the promise of the Chief Judgeship was not to be. Or perhaps the Governor would rather have as counsel someone who would remain for more than the balance of this year. All these scenarios certainly would have discussed, so that leaves us to believe that there must be something more.

Shirley Werner Kornreich was nominated for the Supreme Court seat vacated February 4th by Stephen Crane, but she still is awaiting State Senate confirmation. Sen. Bruno should "unleash" his Republicans to do so or he may not get any governor-appointed Republican Court of Claims judges. Since Paterson is getting along better with Bruno predecessor, than his Kornriech's confirmation could be imminent. elevation to the State trial bench would create a County-wide Civil court seat, but until this actually occurs, the Party is not seeking applicants.

Meanwhile, our Party's screening panel is reviewing the three candidates (Nora Anderson, John Reddy, Milton Tingling) seeking the Surrogate Court seat created by the retirement of Rene Roth, who reached the constitutional-mandated retirement age.

When our son David came home from his first day at PS 163, my wife and I wondered what he had discovered in public school.

- -How was school, we asked.
- -Okay, he said.

Public School 163 is on West 97th Street near Amsterdam Avenue in Manhattan. The district houses a variety of middle-class and working poor whose ancestors came from all corners of the world. Realtors refer to the area, erroneously, as the Upper West Side, though geographically it is still in the southern half of New York Island. To the east are housing projects and Central Park; to the north are Columbia University, CCNY and Harlem.

- What are the kids in your class like, David?
- Nice.

Not given to long-winded explanations, David munched his peanut butter sandwich.

– David, what do the kids in your class look like?

He stopped eating and looked up in surprise.

- They're all brownies and pinkies!
- Brownies and pinkies?
- Most are brownies.

He commenced chomping his peanut butter sandwich.

As I sat in awe at David's perception of reality, I looked at my hand and at my wife's face: we were indeed pinkies. David had made a brilliant observation; he didn't call his classmates 'blackies' or 'whities,' for in fact they were not white or black. We had met a few of David's classmates: dark-hued Jina, whose parents came from Kerala, India, had long, shiny coal-black hair; blond, curly-haired African-Americans Abraham and Jacob were born in Durban, South Africa. David was color-observant, not color-blinded, nor misled by what older people might say about race. At

age six he had jumped over, if not shattered, the race-color line.

The air in America would be calmer and sweeter if the news media adopted the phrase 'pinkies and brownies' instead of misleading terms such as 'blacks and whites.' Look at the players and fans at an American baseball game; you will see pinkies and brownies.

Political candidates running for office should take an oath to use pinkie/brownie rather than black/white in their speeches. It's time we Americans stopped dividing people into racial groups. This world is big enough for all shades of men and women. We are just a small slice of this mixed-up and multi-hued gaggle of six billion brownies and pinkies. A six-year-old can lead us.


Free Legal Assistance for Tenants
